Heart of VA Region's Kiwanis Family Fun Festival

The Heart of Virginia held its inaugural Kiwanis Family Fun Festival on August 11 at St. Joseph's Villa, providing games and activities for over 200 children and family members in the community. Fifteen Kiwanians and attendees donated a pint of blood each at a Kiwanis blood drive at the Festival.

The Festival was sponsored by five clubs in Division 4: Ashland, Greater Richmond, North Richmond, Richmond and Tuckahoe. More than fifty Kiwanians from these clubs plus two volunteers from the James River Club in Division 18 participated. In addition, the Kiwanis Clubs of Chester and Midlothian in Division 18 provided assistance and guidance during the planning stages.

"The Festival not only provided a fun day for the children and their families, it also raised awareness in the community of the aims and good works of Kiwanis, including the Eliminate Project," said Immediate Past Lt. Governor John Morris. "There are discussions by other clubs in the Heart of Virginia region to have similar Family Fun Festivals in their communities."

Tracie Grady of the Kiwanis Club of Greater Richmond chaired the event. For the benefit of other Kiwanians, she has prepared a planning packet, with all of the information and templates required to run such an event. Do you know about our Capital District Kiwanis Foundation? Do you know what this charitable arm of our organization does? Well, let me fill you in!

Your Foundation does a lot. For example last year we supported the seven pediatric hospitals by donating \$24,500, which came to \$3,500 for each hospital. (Since we first started gifting the seven pediatric hospitals, you've donated well over a half-million dollars.) We also sponsored, 'The Teenager of the Year' and 'The Robert H. Turner' Scholarships. We gave matching funds for the 'Kiwanis International Foundation Scholarships' and we supported our 'SLP's' with donations.

(Be sure to make an announcement at your Club meeting that all the Scholarship Applications can be downloaded from our website.) As you look around, you'll see many other features. you have any questions about the Foundation, email or call me and we'll see if we can get it online.

The CDKF began in 1972 with the purpose of assisting needy persons, particularly young people, in attaining vocational excellence, and to aid handicapped persons in regaining happy, useful lives. We're a 501(c)(3) Organization and all Capital District Kiwanians are members of the CDKF. But please don't confuse our Capital District Foundation with the Kiwanis International Foundation (KIF). They're two separate foundations.

The governing body of your CDKF consists of, one Director from each Division in the Capital District, plus the District Governor, the District Governor-Elect, the District Secretary-Treasurer, the immediate-past District Governor, and the immediate-past CDKF President. Additionally, the

Foundation's Secretary, the Treasurer, and our Financial Advisor are appointed by the Board.

Now, armed with the above information, you can think about joining us and becoming a director of the CDKF. Just contact your division's Lt. Governor to get the information on how you can be a part of this very rewarding service.

Oh yes, if your Club hasn't already sent in their \$2+ per member, per year, Club Gift to help us to continue supporting all of these activities, please do it now while you're thinking about it. Many smaller Clubs send in \$100 or more and a lot of Clubs match the KIF \$5 per member request.

NEW: Eliminate recognitions for your Kiwanis-family clubs

Every US\$1.80 counts when we're talking about protecting mothers and babies from maternal and neonatal tetanus. We know it will take the efforts of every Kiwanis-family member to reach our US\$110 million goal. That's why Service Leadership Programs (SLP) -CKI, Key Club, Aktion Club, Builders Club and K-Kids club- and their members are being recognized for their contributions.

New this Kiwanis year, starting October 1, 2012, Kiwanis-family clubs are eligible for special annual recognition when their contributions reach an established level of giving.

- Elimidallion: award given to any SLP member or advisor who makes a one-time donation of US\$625
- 1K Clubs: status given to SLP clubs reaching the US\$1,000 donation level in one year (Oct. 1–Sept. 30)
- Global Service Society: gold, silver and bronze levels of recognition, based on the SLP's per-member average of their contributions within one year (Oct. 1–Sept. 30)

Everything you need to know about the new club bylaws

Last month, the Kiwanis International Board approved the final version of the new Standard Form for Club Bylaws. What does that mean for your club? In a word: flexibility.

The new club bylaws present clubs with fewer rules and more options than in the past, plus new club policies that can be adapted to each club. For example, the minimum number of club directors will be three (not five).

The revised Standard Form is being prepared now for clubs to submit online beginning approximately December 1. In the meantime, go to www.KiwanisOne.org/NewClub-Bylaws to preview the new copy and consult the updated FAQs.

Capital District earns 10 matching scholarships from the Kiwanis International Foundation

Congratulations are in order again to the Capital District. For the second year in a row the Kiwanis Clubs of the Capital District have shown their dedication to the children of the world by sharing their treasure with The Kiwanis International Foundation. The benchmark of \$5.00 per member was exceeded with an 11th hour surge of generosity from Kiwanis Clubs and Kiwanians from throughout the District. At our District Convention at Reston Town Center in August the Capital District was nearly \$3000.00 short of this mark. During the second half of August through the end of September 2012, Kiwanis Champions stepped up from throughout the District and stated in no uncertain terms that they cared about the future of Children in the world... and that includes Children right here in our own District. Going from an average per member of around \$4.49 Kiwanians contributed enough to The Kiwanis International Foundation to reach an astonishing \$5.48 average per member, ranking the Capital District sixth in the entire world in terms of Annual Club Gifts to our signature Kiwanis International Foundation.

Supporting our Kiwanis International Foundation Annual Gift Campaign fuels the Foundation to allow Kiwanians to support The Eliminate Project which reaches out to the world to save babies lives. These annual gifts allow the Foundation to continue to support and promote all of our Service Leadership Programs as well as Key Leader. Our Foundation is able to provide grants to Kiwanis Clubs throughout the world (including right here at home) which support programs which empower children and promote their health and basic needs.

In return, for our support The Kiwanis International Foundation also provides Districts with funds to award matching scholarships to our Key Clubbers and CKI members . For the second year in a row the Capital District has earned ten of these matching scholarships which are tradition-

ally matched by our own Capital District Kiwanis Foundation http://foundation.capitaldistrictkiwanis.org/. Together these scholarships provide \$10,000.00 worth of educational support to our SLP members. Once again thank you to ALL of the KIWANIS CHAMPIONS who stepped up to show their support. In the end 19 out of 21 Divisions reached or exceeded the benchmark of \$5.00 per member. Special thanks are in order to Divisions 11, 18 and 20 which all exceeded \$6.44 per member. Leading the entire Capital District in philanthropy was Division 22 which reached the incredible average of \$8.58 per member. This is a true tribute to The Children of the World. Thank you again to every club and every Kiwanian in the District who contributed to this effort.

Key Leader 2012 Season Finishes, But Spring Is Just Around The Corner!

The weekend of November 9-11, 2012, Capital District held its first Fall Key Leader event and third of the 2012 year. We were fortunate to have our own Josh Hiscock (Crofton, MD) as the lead facilitator for what was a great and transformative experience for our attendees. This event was also the first time we utilized the Northern Virginia 4-H Educational Center in Front Royal for Key Leader. This camp is used every year for the District's Kiwanis-Family Weekend and for the last couple of years has also been the new home for CKI's Fall Membership Rally.

Jaime Jeffers (Woodbridge, VA) served as site coordinator for the event which saw 65 student attendees, 8 student facilitators, as well as 17 adult chaperones participating in the weekend-long event focused on the principles of service leadership. This year, she takes over as chairperson of the Kiwanis International Committee on Key Leader. We are very grateful to the clubs



and individual members who generously donated funds to allow many of our students to attend the 2012 events, particularly the Front Royal camp. Several student attendees have already expressed interest in starting Key Clubs at their local high schools as a result of the experience they had.



My Kiwanis Moment Justin Garrow - Kiwanis Club of Parkville

I actually had my first Kiwanis moment when I was in Key Club back in the New York District. My sponsoring Kiwanis Club of Niagara Falls had an annual event they hosted at the local Salvation Army. It was a Christmas Party for area children in need. We would provide lunch for all of them and, normally, I would always help with the face painting or the balloon animals. However, there was one fateful year where the Kiwanian who was our Santa Claus put out his back and could not come. We were at a loss because we had to have Santa there to give out the presents!



Well, after we saw the costume there was only one person who could fit into it...me. At first, I didn't want to do it, but I begrudgingly put it on. I thought for sure the kids would know I was not the real thing because my shoes couldn't even zip up since they were about three sizes too small!

It came time for me to walk out with a great big, "HO HO HO!" Never before had I ever had such a welcoming when walking into a room! I went to my chair to talk to the children and give out the presents. Right away all the children started to line up. After a couple of kids had come through the line I had a little boy about the age of six who was next. Seeing it was his turn he ran up to me and gave me the BIGGEST hug a six year old could give. With tears in his eyes he said, "I love you Santa! Thank you, if you didn't come today I wouldn't have Christmas!" I hadn't even given him a gift yet! My heart melted immediately. I looked him in the eye and said, "I know you've been a good boy this year...you deserve this." I gave him the biggest and best gift I could get my hands on and one more hug for the road. Before this experience I had never had a moment that had moved me to tears. The rest of the day was such a blur of happiness that I was surprised that it had come to an end so quickly. In that instant I knew I had just experienced something so special. I knew that being a member of the Kiwanis Family had made a mark in my life that day. It has stayed with me all these years. I knew then that the Kiwanis Family would forever be a part of my life because of the impact that I can have on the life of others.

Protecting Our Children and Our Clubs

An April, 2012 Kiwanis Magazine article discussed how criminal background checks can help protect both children and Kiwanis. It said that Safe Hiring Solutions is available to help Kiwanis by ensuring criminal history records are gathered in a timely, accurate and secure manner so no parent need worry if their children are at any risk from Kiwanians.

We try to serve the children of the world, and to do so safely. Sometimes this means taking on a situation with an element of risk. When we sponsor a baseball team, there is always the danger someone may be hurt during the course of the game. We maintain the field, secure the bases, and use all the proper equipment.

In short, we do everything possible to ensure the game will be an enjoyable and rewarding experience for the players and fans. If someone is hurt despite these efforts, our insurance helps provide for medical care after the injury. It's the best we can do after the fact.

What we're doing is managing risks, which is an important part of our responsibility as Kiwanians. Of course, we have insurance coverage in case something goes wrong. But the best way to manage a risk is to do everything we can to avoid the problem in the first place. Criminal background

checking can be a key part of this.

Every day we see on tv or read in the news about an organization being sued for alleged misconduct by its leaders or members. Frequently, the allegations refer to sexual misconduct directed toward the very youngsters whose care has been entrusted to that organization.

A recent case claims the Boy Scouts maintained records of persons who volunteered to help in scouting activities, but who, for whatever reason, were now no longer eligible to work with youth.

The inference was that the Scouts had decided these individuals should no longer be permitted to work with youth, but that they failed to alert parents or others responsible for the youngsters' care about this. This legal case may grind on for years, and it is

not my purpose to discuss the legal issues here.

For some years, KI has required that all Kiwanis International Officers, including District Governors, Governors-Elect, and any persons with administrative responsibilities involving youngsters in the Kiwanis Family must be background checked.

In addition, the Capital District decided some time ago that all District Officers would be routinely background checked before being placed in those positions.

The question now is whether, in light of the way this issue has come under such intense public scrutiny, we must do something more. We seek not only to give the younger members of the Kiwanis Family an enjoyable experience, but also to develop younger

The results of this analysis must be important to you, as it will give you valuable insight into the strengths and weaknesses of your club. These results are conclusive. DO NOT DISMISS THEM. Do not try and rationalize them. The results are the truth and are extremely important to the growth and direction of your club. This is the first step of your growth process as it uncovers the areas for future success of your club and most importantly shows you what your goals and expectations really look like.

This new vision looks different for each and every club as our analysis produces different findings. No two clubs will look and feel the same and that is one of the very cool things about our organization as a

whole. We all share the same focus to change the world one child and one community at a time but each of our clubs fulfill that mission in uniquely different ways. What is likely to be exactly the same amongst every club is our mutual desire to grow, to recruit more members so we may serve more people in return. So how do we grow our club? Easily--with a plan! A well organized and strategic plan. First, start with the results of your Club Excellence Tool. Growth without addressing the findings of this tool will surely disappear in short order. Next, check out the growth tools and models

- Be flexible. Consider changing your meeting times and frequency.
 Some clubs meet only every other week. Some meet online.
- Reach out. Participate in every community activity and event you can. It's great publicity. Learn more about how public relations can help you grow.
- Learn from the best. Visit other clubs to get ideas. Get involved at the division, district, and international levels. Find a club now.

How did we increase our membership by over 25%?

"Back in 2006, the Kiwanis Club of Tysons Corner/McLean made it a priority to have (at least) 2 solid projects that a number of members could go to per month. Quantity isn't always the answer when you have only two or three members attending. Prospective members join a club to do service because they want the comradery- otherwise they would do service on their own. We also found it important to have two fun social events per month. Service projects are important, but you also need opportunities for the members to get to know eachother on a more personal level, which can sometimes be hard in a meeting setting. We promoted the club on Craigslist, not under "Groups" which would be the obvious location, but under "Volunteers." People that are searching under the Volunteers section are looking for ways to get involved NOW, and that is how we engaged them."

Fundraising Technology at Your Fingertips

Small transactions via credit card have become a staple of our society in the 21st century. More and more individuals prefer the comfort of swiping their credit or debit card for payments instead of using cash. The benefits are obvious...you don't run out as easily, you don't have to keep change in your purse or pocket, many credit cards have rewards attached to every dollar you charge and your credit card statement allows you to track your spending better than with cash. Many people no longer carry checkbooks, but they always have a credit or debit card handy.

In the past, businesses needed to establish a merchant account with a bank and purchase or rent an expensive device that needed phone connectivity to accept payments by credit card. The high fees involved kept this process out of reach for the type of small infrequent transactional business that a Kiwanis club would benefit from. As society has changed the way it transacts business, several companies have developed solutions that allow your Kiwanis club to inexpensively accept credit card payment for dues, fundraisers or anything. In this article, I'm going to cover the two most popular methods.

Square - Square was the first to market with their solution which provides a free credit card reader and app for

your Apple or Android mobile phone or tablet. Once you create your account at www.squareup.com, and you provide the checking or savings account that you want the funds deposited to, they will ship you the reader. You plug it in and start swiping. They charge no activation fees, no termination fees and no monthly fees. It's simply one flat transaction fee of 2.75% for any transaction you conduct using their reader and app. The funds are deposited to your linked bank account the next business day automatically.

PayPal Here - Many of you have probably heard of PayPal. They started as a service allowing you to send and receive money from your friends by attaching your bank account to a PayPal account. For a long time, PayPal has functioned as a merchant service, allowing businesses to use a PayPal account to accept credit card payments, typically for eCommerce transactions via websites. Recently they launched PayPal Here which lets any individual or business with a PayPal account accept credit or debit card transactions using their Apple or Android mobile phone or tablet device without any monthly fee. Like Square, when you sign up, they send you a free card card reader that plugs into your mobile phone or tablet that works with their free app. You can then swipe any



Visa, Mastercard, Discover or American Express and charge any amount to that card. The funds are deposited within minutes into your PayPal account which you can use for payment, directly spend with a PayPal Debit Card or transfer in 2-3 business days to any connected checking or savings account. Like Square, the only fee collected by PayPal is 2.7% of the transaction amount.

Both services have their benefits, but PayPal Here seems to be more the more flexible of the two and is very slightly less expensive (.05% per transaction). The funds take a little longer to transfer to a linked bank account though so your club may decide that Square is the right option if time is of the essence to have the funds. Either way, your club now has a new way to enhance their fundraisers by taking advantage of the swipe of plastic.



Getting the Word Out

Club Public Relations: Tips to Increase Club Visibility

Much conventional wisdom about public relations for Kiwanis clubs is dated, or is fast becoming that way. What do we mean?

Newspapers Have Changed and So Must We

Remember when we could write a news release for the local newspaper about new club officers, a pancakebreakfast, or a reading program at the library – and expect it to be published? Well, newspapers have changed and we must change with them.

This is especially true in large metro areas where the major media are far removed from the communities where our clubs exist. In the Capital District, think Washington DC, Norfolk/ Tidewater and Richmond in Virginia, and Baltimore in Maryland. But smaller markets are affected too, places like Roanoke, Charlottesville and Newport News in Virginia and Dover in Delaware.

So what can we do in those areas to promote the Kiwanis "brand" and individual clubs? And what things can clubs in smaller communities do that may not work in metro areas?

Market Your Club to Other Community Organizations

Every area, large or small, has business and community organizations. Think Chamber of Commerce and other groups where community leaders gather. See that your club is represented, by a compatible person who will and has the ability to get involved



in the group and become known to its leaders. If you are that person, be sure the others know you are representing Kiwanis -- by pins, badges and, where appropriate, branded clothing. And do not hesitate to hand out your club's brochure to the people with whom you work.

Clubs should have a printed handout. It can be a three-fold flier or a two-sided display card. But it should be in full color, have photos as well as text, and be sized to mail in a #11 envelope. Get professional help with layout and text. To work well, it should look good and be interesting. When high-profile events occur in your community, your club should be there and make its presence known. A representative from the local Relay for Life told our club recently about levels of contribution and how we would

be recognized for each -- things like our name on the Relay tee shirt and our name with the Kiwanis logo on a banner hung across a major street in town. The costs were reasonable and the community exposure should be great. They said we also could enter a team, which would mean presence at the event and also a chance display Kiwanis. Ditto for things like a fence sign at the Little League field.

Court Community Media - and Occasionally the "Big Boys"

Even if the Washington Post is your daily metro newspaper, there are community publications, some daily or weekly newspapers and some give-aways. But they all need material to fill pages and if your stories area timely and interesting -- and a

high-quality photo is attached -- they are likely to be printed and read by your neighbors. And don't forget the community bulletin boards that most larger papers publish, in print and online. Be sure your meetings and other events are listed. Online, there may also be place for your club to post its press releases.

And on the rare occasions where your club has a high-interest story, maybe growing out of a service project, don't be afraid to try to sell it to the Post or your metro area newspaper. Beforehand, you should have identified the right contact person. Assign this task of pitching this story to your club's best sales person. Remember, even large metro newspapers need good human-interest stories. If such a story involves your Kiwanis club, you could win big time.

Maybe the large TV and radio stations in your metro market are not candidates for club news items, but look for radio stations that serve just one area of the larger region. Get to know their news people and those responsible for public service announcements, which most radio stations still broadcast without charge. The same applies to the public access channels on your cable television systems.

Banners, Signs and Service Club Boards

Get and keep a supply of banners and signs that can be displayed at your functions, and use them for pre-event promotions. If you cannot hang a banner across a major street, there may be places where you can display a big yard sign to promote your project. Have a local sign shop make a few of

these, sturdy enough that they can be repainted and reused several times. Most smaller towns still have sign boards on which local service clubs can display their logos. If your club is in such a community, be sure you are on that board and that your emblem i fresh and attractive. If no such display board exists, find out if the local government will let you place individual Kiwanis signs on highway entrances to town with your meeting time and place.

Finally, don't forget the new digita media. Your club should be on Facebook with a page that is frequently updated with interesting things that you do, photos, and even short videos. In fact, that page could become your new club newsletter. If you have a club website, its information must current. Your newsletter (if any) should be on the website for people to read, and you should post timely reports and photos of club events. In short, make your website an interesting place that people will want to visit and revisit.

Make PR a Year-Round Job in Your

By now, it should be obvious that good public relations for your club is no hit or miss matter. Every club needs two or more members whose jobs are to make sure you are known favorably in your community – in the ways mentioned, and others. And your PR team needs a plan to publicize the club, and full support of its leaders and members.

We have talked about Club PR in three issues of this magazine. Now, it's time to get to work.

The club key number identifies a club. Each club has one number. Today we know that an earlier Key Number signifies an older club and that is a correct assumption, if the club was organized after August 1919. Prior to that date it was not the case. Past District Historian and Past Governor Fred Terrell found the answer as to why Baltimore (K0009) has an earlier Key Number than Washington (K00131). In 1915 there is Detroit (K00001) and Cleveland (K00002). January 31 Pittsburg became K00003. After that if you list the next 152 clubs alphabetical, your answer will be given.

leaders for the future. Do we therefore owe them and ourselves greater protection against predators who are clearly 'out there'?

If you think about it, we are a natural 'target' for any predators. We are unique among service groups for the many levels and different ages of youngsters in our care. For that reason, we have to be especially vigilant in our efforts to prevent such a problem here before it starts.

We have many options, and our District Leadership is assessing them now. Some Districts now perform background checks on all Kiwanians within that District. Others are looking into expanding background checks to include not just those who administer programs for youngsters, but virtually all Kiwanians who have regular contact with youngsters. It is a District decision, at this point, but we need input from the clubs to strike the proper balance.

One way to handle this would be for each club to background check all club members who have contact with younger Kiwanis Family members. This could help ensure that nothing in the Kiwanian's background would suggest that he or she should not be entrusted with such a serious responsibility.

This would be a major step toward the goal of doing the best we can to prevent this very serious problem from arising in the Capital District. It would, however, be a costly step, and much if not all of that cost would have to be borne by the clubs agreeing to do this. This issue will be discussed by the District Board in February, and they would benefit greatly from input from members.
