

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
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Governor's Message


While I have had many Kiwanis moments, the ones that always bring a smile to my face and warmth to my heart are the experiences I had with Terrific Kids at Maymont Elementary School. We would go to Maymont four times a year and hand out stickers, pencils, rulers and similar rewards to children who were Thoughtful, Enthusiastic, Respectful, Responsible, Inclusive, Friendly, Inquisitive and Capable ("TERRIFIC"). With the entire school in the audience, the students would be called individually to come on stage to receive their rewards from Kiwanians and to be congratulated by Kiwanians and their principal. The joy and pride showing on the faces of the children as they crossed the auditorium stage was amazing.

The value of what we were doing was brought home to me by the Principal. She told us how excited she was to see so many children who were never recognized at the school have a moment

in the spotlight walking across the stage.

Terrific Kids is so valuable because, rather than recognizing smart children for outstanding academic accomplishments, it rewards good behavior and good effort. While academic achievement is important, learning to be a good person and a good citizen is vital to their long-term health and happiness. Terrific Kids builds character and teaches children that if they do things the right way and behave themselves, they will be successful.

After having presented at Terrific Kids ceremonies for a couple of years, I received further confirmation of how much good the program does for our children and our communities. My sister, who was at that time a second grade teacher in Lynchburg, learned that I was a Kiwanian. Her face lit up. She exclaimed "Terrific Kids! That is the most wonderful program!" Needless to say, she loved what it did for her students.



Maymont School was unfortunately closed by the City of Richmond during a round of school consolidations. However, Terrific Kids continues in many schools. I am comforted with the knowledge that those children that we recognized on the Maymont stage received the valuable gift of the feeling of self-worth and pride which they still carry with them.

Members honored on International Volunteer Day

Kiwanis club members annually donate 18.5 million hours for service projects, with an economic impact of nearly half a billion dollars, all to improve the lives of children around the world.

On International Volunteer Day, Saturday, December 5, Kiwanis International will recognize the efforts of club members from Japan to England and Australia to the United States, so that one day all children will wake up in communities that believe in them, nurture them and provide the support they need to thrive.

"We know our clubs make a difference in their communities," said Sue Petrisin, 2015-16 Kiwanis International president. "And when we tally service hours and the value of a volunteer hour, Kiwanians have an economic impact of US\$426,795,000, which shows that no effort is too small when combined with the larger goal of serving the children of the world."

Every year, Kiwanis club members donate a combined 18.5 million hours of volunteer service. The Independent Sector estimates \$23.07 as the hourly volunteer rate, making the total Kiwanis impact at US\$426,795,000.

"We know kids need Kiwanis, and thankfully our volunteers are up to the task, providing time, energy and talent to provide a better future for children in communities around the world," Petrisin said. "On International Volunteer Day, and every day, the Kiwanis leadership and members of the board of trustees say a hearty thank you to our nearly 670,000 members who know they can make a difference in the life of a child."

One million U.S. Dollars closer to MNT goal

A message from The Eliminate Project Chairman Randy DeLay

We are US\$1 million closer to our goal thanks to the Indiana District. The recent pledge brings our fundraising totals to more than US\$104 million*, which will save or protect more than 55 million women and their future babies from maternal and neonatal tetanus (MNT). New-club chartering kit updated

During the October 2015 meeting of the Kiwanis International Board it was decided that the gong and gavel found in the new-club chartering kit be replaced with comparable items of less expense. This decision was made as a cost-cutting measure resulting from the expansion of the dues waiver for clubs opened between January and September.

Effective for clubs chartered after January 1, 2016, the new-club chartering kit will feature a gavel and personalized gavel stand instead of a gong and gong top (which can still be purchased from the Kiwanis Family Store). It is estimated this change will reduce the organization's expense for charter gift kits by approximately US\$60,000 annually. There will also be a significant decrease in the cost of

shipping, as the brass gong and top are very heavy and costly to ship.

Beyond the Call


Ronny V. Turner

Lt. Governor Ronny V. Turner embodied the true Kiwanis spirit of service before self. He joined Haysi Kiwanis on March 31, 1994 and had 7 years of perfect attendance. Ronny held many positions, including Division 17 Lt Governor, club president, and Master of Ceremony for the club Truck Pulls, Horse Shows and the Annual Easter Egg Hunt. Often times his wife Gloria would proudly help with these fundraising events.

Most notably, he was the Vice Chairman for the Dickenson County Fair – the Haysi Kiwanis Club's largest fundraising event of the year. The Fair is held the first week in August every year at the Kiwanis Park, hosting thousands of visitors.

Despite his terminal prognosis, Ronny lived each day to its fullest. Fellow club members did not expect to see him at this year's fair, yet he came out to work just as he did years prior. "I had just joined Kiwanis last November and Ronny took me under his wing and became my mentor. He recruited me to be on the fair committee and when he fell ill, I sensed he had one more mission to complete before he retired," remembers Ron Peters. "Ronny was not going to let the show fail--he came out to train me so I could take over his duties. This epitomizes his dedication and commitment to Kiwanis and his community."



Club members would agree that that dedication was typical Ronny. He was wired to do his part for Kiwanis and the public he loved. Ronny passed away on away October 25, 2015 at the age of 66, and his loss has been felt around the community.

"I feel fortunate to have become friends with Ronny and I am so pleased that I was able to attend a recent dinner in Haysi during which he was honored for his years of service to the community with a Walter Zeller Fellowship," said Governor David Heppner. "Ronny will be long remembered for the positive impact he made on those around him, and he will be greatly missed."
