

# Petersburg Kiwanis Club promotes healthy lifestyles on day of service

Service Project Tip #10: Focus on activities to promote healthy living for children.

PETERSBURG - In honor of its international one day of service Saturday, the Petersburg Kiwanis Club hosted "Move it, Move it-Kiwanis Style."

The event, which focused on living a healthy lifestyle, included activities such as double-dutch jump rope, Zumba, football, boxing, basketball, and arts and crafts.

Commonwealth's Attorney Cassandra Conover, Lieutenant Governor-Designate for Division 10 Kiwanis International, helped organize the event at Peabody Middle School.

"There were bad reports out about the state of our health here in Petersburg, so we decided that we wanted to expose the youth to different things about health and wellness," Conover said of the activity-oriented service project.

In 2012, Petersburg was listed as the unhealthiest place to live in Virginia by a report from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and University of Wisconsin researchers.

"It's all about wellness and it's all about service," Conover said. As a Kiwanis Club member, which works to improve the lives of children, Conover wanted to bring a variety of activities to the children.

"I firmly believe in taking any negativity and turning it into something positive. ... If our children are not healthy, maybe they just need resources," Conover said.

Patricia Clement, a special projects officer with the Petersburg Bureau of Police and a Kiwanis Club member, was volunteering to teach children how to double-dutch jump rope. She thinks events like "Move it, Move it-Kiwanis Style" are positive for the community, and wanted to get at least 50 children jumping rope.

"I have kids that say they have never jumped before and they're scared, so even if I can teach two of them to jump, or one, to teach them something that they haven't done that's going to benefit their health, that works for me," Clements said.

In addition to promoting physical activity for a healthy body, motivational speaker Maurice Bowles III encouraged everyone to have a healthy mind and spirit. Bowles, an associate minister at Gillfield Baptist Church who attended Peabody Middle, told the children it's important to "be well



in every area of your life."

"I just enjoy being able to talk to young people, especially in my city ... seeing them smile and enjoy the presentation, that is bigger than any paycheck that I can receive," Bowles said.


In his presentation, Bowles encouraged those in attendance to live a positive lifestyle and surround themselves with positive influences. You "cannot change the way you think until you start depositing new thoughts," Bowles told them.

"A lot of kids, especially at this age, if everybody else is doing it, I want to do it. Programs like this give them an opportunity outside of school to get some positive reinforcement. A lot of




As part of Eastern Branch's Charter Anniversary, I would do my first special presentation honoring Dr. Luther D. Robinson who I knew by his smile, twinkling eyes and his favorite service projects as a Kiwanian teaching ASL and dressing as Santa Claus to sign "T'was the night before Christmas" for children. He provided me his biography along with an essay about the legacy he hoped to leave. Five hand-typed pages about his life's work, a commitment to provide psychiatric services to the deaf community to improve their life one patient at a time, when he realized individuals who were deaf and mute had been diagnosed with mental defects and placed in psychiatric wards because no one knew how to communicate with them and how he knew he would make a difference. In his own words I understood why he joined Kiwanis. What could I possibly do to show that I understood the value of his service, the importance of his legacy and my willingness to take up his standard?

I sought out his colleagues at St. Elizabeth's and Howard University Hospitals and Howard and Gallaudet where he was a visiting professor to invite them. When the administrator at Gallaudet who I'd sent the invite to distribute to the staff called me, she told me when she typed his name into their system it said "Friend to Gallaudet" which made her curious and once she asked around his colleagues asked could they provide free interpreters for the evening and make their own special presentation to recognize him for all he had done for the school and it's students.

When Luther arrived I pinned his boutonnière and escorted him to his place of honor. At his seat was a special touch inspired by a song I learned to sign in high school "Love in any Language", a balloon bouquet imprinted with "I Love You" in sign language. Another surprise was a reprint of the cover of the June 7, 1971 issue of Time Magazine and the article "Education: KUDOS: Round 1".

### "GALLAUDET COLLEGE

Luther D. Robinson, Sc.D., psychiatrist and acting superintendent of St. Elizabeth's Hospital in Washington, D.C. Deafness makes mental health problems difficult to detect



and treat. [He] has brought attention to the mental needs of deaf people."

You could see he was touched to have his colleagues, students and fellow Ki-wanis members pack the room. He loved all the presentations, gifts and the magazine reprint but it was those balloons he cradled gingerly at the end of the night.

As we approach the 100th anniversary of Kiwanis, I am living in my Kiwanis moments of reflection, remembrance and gratitude for the many Kiwanians, just like Dr. Luther D. Robinson who have contributed to our organization and the legacy that we have been entrusted with.

# **Get Potential Members to "Meetup"**

Have your club's traditional recruitment tactics gone stale? Are you looking for a new way to find prospective members? Take a cue from other Kiwanis Clubs and become a Meetup Group.

With almost 16 million members, Meetup is the world's largest network of local groups. Meetup makes it easy for anyone to organize a local group or find one of the thousands already meeting up face-to-face. More than 9,000 groups get together in local communities each day, each one with the goal of improving themselves or their communities.

Many Kiwanis Clubs are opting to promote their club as a Meetup Group, so that individuals who are interested in community service and leadership development can find their meetings and other events. Meetup will email members directly who live in your area that are most likely to be interested in your club.

Meetup's services are very affordable. They don't charge individuals to create an account, to join a Meetup


Group, or go to meetings. Instead, every Meetup Group is responsible for paying a fee billed to the Group's Organizer. There are 3 price plans: \$12 a month for 6 months (a single \$72 charge); \$15 a month for 3 months (a single \$45 charge); or \$19 per month. Organizers can run up to 3 Meetup Groups at a time under any of the above plans.

It's a few easy steps to start your Meetup Group and attract your first members. Meetup even includes tips and examples in case you get stuck. To start a Meetup Group, click "Start a Meetup Group" at the top of any page on Meetup. Follow the steps to customize your Meetup Group, and submit your billing information for



your Organizer Dues plan. You'll receive a receipt via email, and you can start organizing your new Meetup Group immediately. About three days later, Meetup will email all interested members in the area and invite them to join your new group!

Did you visit a Kiwanis park or pancake breakfast and want to learn more? What do you enjoy about your experience? Why do you remain committed to serving the children of the world?

What would make your experience better? What are your club's aspirations and what would it take to reach them? Do you need to think about trying some new fundraisers? Is there an unmet service need in your community that even more hearts and hands working together could solve? How could you help make your community an even better place?

It also applies to external tools and campaigns that help clubs strengthen membership— and it applies to opportunities and resources for opening clubs in communities that don't yet benefit from Kiwanis.

### Live it.



Be proud! Serve others. Talk about the impact that working with other committed club members has made. Show others that committed, passionate individuals with a heart for children can make an impact. Be a spokesperson for that impact--and have energy for Kiwanis that is contagious.

"Live it" is what happens when Kiwanis members love their Kiwanis experience and, by sharing it with others, strengthen their clubs and, subsequently, increase opportunities for incredible community service. The "Live it" component of The Formula includes everything from proudly wearing a Kiwanis pin or logo to engaging in club activities—especially community service.

The number of students in the three schools is nearly 950, with the hope that each one will achieve Terrific Kid status within the academic year.

The Terrific Kids recognition programs are well attended by school teachers & administrators, parents and Kiwanis club members. The club gets very positive feedback from families, teachers, principals and of course from the "terrific kids" themselves.

# **Beyond the Call**


At 83 years young, John has been a member of Kiwanis International since 1966, when he was first affiliated with the Linwood, WA club, where he served in several leadership positions, including Club President. A retired Navy Chief Petty Officer and decorated Vietnam Veteran, in 2001 John came to the East Coast and joined the Kiwanis Club of Virginia Beach. Here, he has continued to be an exceptionally active member in club service and administrative duties, working our golf tournaments, 50/50 raffles, is a Board member of the Kiwanis Children's Council of Hampton Roads, supporting other charity fundraisers. He has also been a member of the Club Board of Directors and a Key Club Advisor for many years.

John also excels as the epitome of a Community Servant--a member of the Board of Directors for the Virginia Beach Judeo-Christian Outreach Center (JCOC) which provides residential and transient facilities, training, rehabilitation and food for local homeless and others in need of support.

Above and beyond: although retired, John normally devotes between 40 and 80 hours every week volunteering in the food services section at JCOC. He picks up and transports donated food from local stores to the JCOC warehouse and freezers. He personally stocks and manages the freezers and food pantry for the facility--a job that would normally require two full time employees.

For many years, our club has committed to support JCOC through direct cash donations and voluntary community service through the preparation and serving of evening meals to the homeless. We do the meal service every other month, on the first Friday of the month. Normally we serve between 80 and 125 homeless, including men, women, and children from this area of Southside Hampton Roads. When it is our club's time to prepare the dinners, John acts as our chief cook, directing our team of Kiwanians in the actually preparation and cooking of the food, preparation of salad, breads, drinks and desserts. Normally, we have at least 6 VB Kiwanis Club members pitching in with the food preparation, and between 4-10 Key Club members serving the meals.

For our Kiwanis One Day project this year, John suggested that our club fund and execute the replacement of a fence needed at JCOC. As usual, John took the lead in "making it happen"!



John has been certified to be our club's Delegate to the International Convention in Japan this year, and with his wife, Nobuko will attend. Coincidentally, Nobuko has a sister living in the city where the convention will convene, so it will also be a family reunion for them.
