

From the Kiwanis Children's Fund

Questions get asked, "What does the Kiwanis Children's Fund do for me, my club or the district?" Let me tell you about a few of their programs that you and your club can support through your giving.

ANNUAL CLUB GIFT CAMPAIGN

Each year, the Kiwanis Children's Fund conducts its Annual Club Gift campaign from October 1 through September 30. Your club's support helps the Kiwanis family serve more children in communities around the world through grants, extending your impact on children's lives.

Your club's participation in this campaign enables the Children's Fund to provide grants that serve Service Leadership Programs, club and district service projects, and the sustained elimination of Iodine Deficiency Disorders and maternal and neonatal tetanus (MNT).

Make your club's gift before January 31 and help Kiwanians reach more children. Your early gift will help the Children's Fund plan and budget for the year, contain fundraising costs and dedicate more time to helping clubs with fundraising, non-profit management and grant applications.

TODAY CLUB

There is no other way to give to so many areas—to touch the lives of so many children and communities—and in so many different ways than by giving a Gift of Today. Gifts of Today come to the Kiwanis Children's Fund from individuals, clubs and other entities. These gifts are the backbone of our organization. Through consistent yearly gifts, one person, one club and one contribution at a time, Kiwanians extend their impact to the children of the world.

The Today Club program honors clubs that achieve a minimum per-member giving level from active duespaying members during the Kiwanis administrative year, which runs from October 1 through September 30. Gifts of Today from clubs, individuals and other entities to the Kiwanis Children's Fund will be counted in determining per-member giving. The per-member giving level for clubs is based on the September 30 membership certified by Kiwanis International.

Clubs can reach one of these per-member giving levels by making an unrestricted gift to the Children's Fund. Whether it's club gifts or individual gifts, any Gift of Today will be counted toward your club's per-member giving average. These club recognitions are awarded annually at the end of the Kiwanis year. Eligible clubs will be determined by the Kiwanis Children's Fund. There are four recognition levels: Blue, Silver, Gold and Diamond. To achieve one of these four levels, clubs must reach the following per-member giving average:

- Blue, US\$10
- Gold, US\$50
- Silver, US\$25
- Diamond, US\$100

TOP FIVE DISTRICT SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

What they support:

The top five districts are eligible to receive scholarships to assist with recipients' post-secondary education expenses as follows:

Top District

• Five (5) US\$2,000 higher education scholarships

Second Place

• Four (4) US\$1,500 higher education scholarships

Third Place

Three (3) US\$1,000 higher education scholarships

Fourth Place

Two (2) US\$1,000 higher education scholarships

Fifth Place

One (1) US\$1,000 higher education scholarship

How they're awarded:

Placement in the top five district scholarship program is based on districts' per-member giving average of unrestricted gifts to the Kiwanis Children's Fund annual campaign between October 1 and September 30 by individuals, clubs and other entities within districts. Scholarship awards are available in the following administrative year.

How districts request scholarships:

This scholarship program is by invitation only. Program information is sent to Kiwanis Children's Fund district chairpersons for the top five districts. Each district chair person coordinates the scholarship program on behalf of his/her district.

LET'S FINISH OUR JOB FOR THE LAST TWELVE ELIMINATE PROJECT COUNTRIES

The symptoms are excruciating. Mothers and babies who contract maternal and neonatal tetanus (MNT) are ultimately robbed of their lives, and death follows days of pain and suffering. The good news is the disease is entirely vaccine preventable. UNICEF and its partners like Kiwanis International are committed to reducing the number of cases to virtually zero, which can be achieved through inexpensive immunization and by promoting hygienic delivery and cord care practices during childbirth.

Since 1999, UNICEF and partners have immunized more than 145 million women in 53 countries — efforts that have helped slash the number of endemic countries by more than two-thirds, from 59 to just 12 today. This is tremendous progress, but the fight is far from over. Making sure that MNT is eliminated once and for all across the globe is all part of a day's work for UNICEF health specialists based around the world and our donations are essential for finishing the job in those last 12 countries.

I am extremely proud of our Capital District Kiwanians for their dedication over ten years for raising \$2.7 million towards the solution for eliminating neonatal tetanus. I remind us all that during the campaign every Capital club gave something as best they could. We are now in the middle of raising the last \$281,998 to finish our pledge.

Our district convention attendance was smaller but a success for our remained MNT pledge amount, having received \$2,830 from attendees with several others planning on sending in their contributions. In addition, I was really thankful that the District Foundation voted to donate \$25.000 to MNT to cover some of those clubs who could not and cannot make further donations themselves. As you may know, our Capital District Key Clubs had pledged to raise \$250,000 during the MNT Campaign. I'm delighted to announce that Key Club Board has made the final payment and completed their pledge.



Every year, Kiwanis club members around the world gather on the fourth Saturday in October for Kiwanis One Day. It's a day set aside for clubs to work together to better their communities — and to invite friends and family to join them. For some clubs, this has had world-wide repercussions by supporting projects with clubs in other countries. This year, Kiwanis One Day will be October 23, 2021. As many clubs return to active service, many may not have that opportunity given local guidelines and restrictions for gathering in a service project. If your club can participate in a One Day activity, that's great! In any case, please consider making a donation to the Childrens' Fund as your Kiwanis One Day project – think of helping the children in those 12 countries.

Our life-changing work in Capital will continue, as we raise money to pay for vaccinations, transportation, training, monitoring and supervision in those remaining 12 countries at risk— so that mothers give birth in clean, safe environments. I ask you to have an impact by making a donation now as we kick off our 2021-22 Kiwanis Year under Governor Elana's leadership as we raise the remaining \$247,437 to complete our pledge. Thanks to all of you who attended (in person or virtually) the Capital District Education and Leadership Conference in Roanoke over the weekend. Here is a "brief" summary for those who may have not attended or missed some portion of the event.

There were 112 registered in-person attendees. At the time there were 141 clubs in the Capital District and 4,012 members.

At the District Board Meeting Friday afternoon, two events scheduled for September (Key Leader and K-Family Weekend) were cancelled due to COVID. Another Key Leader event is still planned for the Spring. K-Family Boards will likely schedule separate Board meetings in September.

The passing of Past Governor and District Secretary-Treasurer Tom Varner was noted at the Board Meeting, as well as at the Governor's Banquet and Business Session. Many members shared personal stories about Tom and his contributions to the Capital District. Sympathies and condolences were expressed to Tom's wife Lin and their family. The passing of District Historian John Fox was also in the hearts of attendees. Governor Dennis Baugh held a moment of silence for all Capital District Kiwanis members who have died during the current Kiwanis year.

Children's Fund Board member and Past Governor John Tyner reported on efforts to get Districts (and members) to fulfill their pledges to The Eliminate Project (to vaccinate against maternal and neonatal Tetanus or MNT). Kiwanis International has "closed the books" on Eliminate, and written off over \$17 million in pledges, much to John's consternation. Our Capital District pledged \$3 million to Eliminate during my year as Governor in 2014-2015. At the beginning of ELC, John indicated that \$2,719,000 had been raised, leaving \$283,000. Despite KI's position, John encouraged us to continue working to complete our pledge and commitment to

Eliminate. I and others agreed. John noted that several thousand additional dollars were contributed by individuals on Friday. He also noted that only 49 clubs in the District have contributed any funds to Eliminate in the past two years. For reference, Capital District pledged and contributed \$1.5 million to the Iodine Deficiency Disorders (IDD) campaign that preceded the Eliminate Project.

At the Past Governors Meeting, we learned that Capital District will have the opportunity to endorse a candidate for International Trustee at the House of Delegates during the Baltimore DCON in 2022. This person would officially announce during the summer of 2023. The PGs will determine whether anyone is interested, and (if more than one person is interested) who to choose over the next year.

At the Capital District Kiwanis Foundation Board Meeting, the Directors approved a \$25,000 contribution to Eliminate! Workshops aligned with were treating Kiwanis as a Verb. Conjunction. Pronoun, Noun. Interjection, Adjective, Adverb, and Preposition. It was a novel approach, and all were presented in sequence; there were no parallel sessions. This was a good format, particular for this scaled down version of conference. As those who attended (in person or virtually) can attest, the presenters were excellent. One highlight was Past Kiwanis International President Jane Erickson who gave the Keynote motivational presentation. Jane is the owner of The Wellness and Training Works, and she is All the workshops inspirational. were recorded and are available for viewing on the District Website.

At the business session, elections and amendments were considered. The voting body consisted of the Delegates-At-Large, i.e. current Lt Governors, Trustees, Executive Officers, and Past Governors. There were 28 delegates present (out of a possible 45), although three of us held current positions as Lt Governors and Past Governors.

The session was uneventful in that the elections were uncontested and the amendments passed without significant discussion or controversy. Elana Gardner was elected Governor-Designate, and Jen Wolff was elected Governor-Elect-Designate for 2021-2022.

All six proposed by laws amendments passed including: (1) Two-year waiver of District dues for former SLP members who join Kiwanis; (2) Prorated District dues for new members; (3) Revision of term limits for Trustees (housekeeping (4) Expansion of correction); geographic boundaries of Capital District to include West Virginia; (5) Temporary status of Immediate Past Governor granted to West Virginia Provisional District Chairperson; and (6) Change title of District Secretary-Treasurer to Executive Director and revoke voting rights.

The Ducky Derby drawings were held with over a dozen cash and gift card prizes given out. Charles Marks announced that over \$12,250 had been raised by contributions to the Ducky Derby.

At the Governor's Banquet, District Officers were recognized. The Teenager of the Year was presented. Remarks were given by the Key Club Governor and CKI Governor. And Governor Dennis Baugh provided his Governor's Remarks.

On Sunday morning, the Closing Session was held. Following an inspirational presentation, "On to 2022 Midyear Conference", "On to Indianapolis ICON 2022", and "On to Baltimore DCON 2022" presentations were made.

The current 2020-2021 District Officers and Chairpersons were "officially" but not really retired, and the 2021-2022 District Officers were installed. (Governor Dennis and Governor-Designate Elana were retired and installed, respectively, by Past International President Jane Erickson.)


























2021 FINAL BYLAWS AMENDMENTS

The Delegates-at-Large of the Business Session uanimously approved the following six bylaws amendments on August 21. 2021 in Roanoke:

Bylaws Amendment #1 - Two-year Waiver of District Dues for Former SLP Members who join Kiwanis Clubs

Add new Section 2 to Article X of District Bylaws and renumber accordingly:

A club shall be relieved of any obligation to pay district dues for any club member for a period of two (2) years from the date of joining that club, provided such member was a former member of a Kiwanis International Service Leadership Program.

Bylaws Amendment #2 - Prorated District Dues for New Members

Add new Section 3, to Article X of District Bylaws and renumber accordingly:

Prorated district dues shall be charged for each new member of a club on the same prorated schedule used by Kiwanis International. Prorated dues are waived for any new member who was a former member of a Kiwanis International service leadership program.

Bylaws Amendment #3 - Revision of Term Limits

Amend Article III, Section 3 as follows:

No person shall serve more than two consecutive terms as a Trustee or Lieutenant Governor.

Bylaws Amendment #4 - Expansion of Geographic Boundaries of the Capital District to Include West Virginia

Amend Article II, Section 2 as follows:

The territorial limits of this district shall be confined to Delaware; Maryland; the District of Columbia, West Virginia; and Virginia except the entire County of Lee, Virginia, and that portion of Wise County, Virginia, that composes the area of the Big Stone Gap, Virginia Kiwanis Club. Neither the district name nor territorial limits shall be changed unless permission shall first have been obtained from the Kiwanis International Board of Trustees.



Bylaws Amendment #5 - Temporary Status of Immediate Past Governor Granted to West Virginia Provisional District Chairperson

Amend Article IV, Section 1 as follows:

PROVISO: Effective only from October 1, 2021 - September 30, 2022

The District Board shall consist of the Governor, Governorelect, Immediate Past Governor, Immediate Past WV Governor, Secretary, Treasurer, and a Trustee for each region.

Bylaws Amendment #6 - Change title of District Secretary-Treasurer to Executive Director and revoke voting rights.

Amend Article III - Officers, Section 1 as follows:

a. The officers of the district shall be the Governor, Governor-elect, Immediate Past Governor, Secretary-Treasurer, and a Lieutenant Governor for each division and/ or a Trustee for each region of the district.

b. No offices other than those of Secretary and Treasurer may be combined in one person. The Secretary-Treasurer has the title of Executive Director.

Replace all other bylaws references to "District Secretary-Treasurer" with "Executive Director"

Amend Article IV - District Board as follows:

Section 1. The District Board shall consist of the Governor, Governor-elect, Immediate Past Governor, Executive Director, and a Trustee for each region. The Executive Director shall be without vote.

The Kiwanis Club of Washington, D.C. is partnering with LSSNCA to help a family who will be resettling in Fairfax County. In the past month, <u>LSSNCA</u> has welcomed 72 families into the DMV area totaling nearly 300 people. On average, they are welcoming approximately 80 people per week and expect that number to steadily increase over the next month as evacuation efforts in Kabul continue.

The club is currently collecting donations to furnish the family's apartment, from furniture to toiletries and all the basic necessities in between. Once assigned a family, they will be assembling furniture and setting up their apartment, stocking it with basic supplies, and welcoming them into their new home with a first meal.

Each item has a priority ranking (lowest, low, medium, high, highest) based on whether it is required or "nice to have." Roanoke, VA

When Roanoke Kiwanis saw the opportunity to assist refugees, President Mike McEvoy assigned our Kiwanis Kares committee to investigate as to how we might help.

The plan for the Kiwanis Club of Roanoke is to get involved with the resettlement of Afghan refugees on multiple levels. We are working with Commonwealth Catholic Charities, the main resettlement agency in the state of Virginia with resettlement offices in Newport News, Richmond and Roanoke. Pending board approval in October, we are going to collect individual contributions to purchase 60 small first aid kits and 25 soccer balls requested by CCC. As housing becomes available, we will put together teams to go in and set up the apartments with beds, furniture and bedroom, bathroom and kitchen kits (all provided by CCC) so the refugees will have the basics needed for move-in.

We have asked our club program chairperson about a possible Wednesday program on bridging cultural norms and have asked our newsletter editor about setting up a small part of the weekly communication to keep members updated on the opportunities to support our new neighbors.

Our SLP coordinator is also checking with our Key Clubs to see how they might be involved.

Kiwanis One Day – if you are reading this article after October 23, then you missed "Kiwanis One Day". The fourth Saturday in October is celebrated Internationally by Kiwanis for clubs to work together to better their communities and invite friends and family to join them. There's a toolkit and suggested media resources here: KiwanisOneDay

These ideas can be used for <u>any</u> community project at <u>any</u> time of the year.

Identify Your Signature Project – these provide valuable and needed service to your community. They also elevate awareness of Kiwanis in your community, engage current members and remind them why they joined Kiwanis, and can involve potential members. Notes from the Executive Director

Happy New Kiwanis Administrative Year! And since it's now past October 1st, I want to start with a warm welcome to all West Virginia Kiwanis club members to the Capital District!

In your clubs, a new Board of Directors has started their year under the guidance of a new club president. By now, your club board should have conducted its training and done its goal setting for the year. At this point, you have also polled your membership and know which members of your club will remain and pay dues and which you need to drop from the roster. Finally, your membership coordinator has a plan and action steps ready to recruit new members into your club.

CLUB TREASURERS Now is the time where we close the books on the previous fiscal year (October 1, 2020 - September 30, 2021) and ensure that a complete review is performed by the two or more members of your club's Financial Review Committee (as dictated in the club's mandatory policies - section F). An annual examination of financial records should include, but not be limited to, bank reconciliations, income, disbursements, budgets, balance sheets and income and expense statements for both the administrative and service accounts, and any other financial records or reports of the club.

CLUB SECRETARIES Please make sure that all of your 2020-21 Monthly Reports were submitted and that you have submitted the 2021-22 Club Election Report. This information is critical to the operation of the District, but more importantly to make sure that the right information is getting to the officers of your club.

YOUTH PROTECTION October is also Youth Protection Month, so please make sure that you have a program within your club on how to safely work with the youth that need our help the most and that all of your Service Leadership Program Advisors have a clear criminal background check as required. At the District level, we have also had a change in leadership. Governor Elana Gardner led the first meeting of the 2021-22 Board of Trustees on September 19th online.

NEW MEMBER PRORATED DUES As of October 1st, both Kiwanis International and Capital District Kiwanis are now operating under a prorated dues schedule for new members who join your club. This chart will show how much your club will be billed for a new member depending on what month they join your club. It is strongly encouraged that your club consider modifying it's club dues to follow the same proration schedule.

a few times a year, here's what your club will be billed for each of your existing members: \$52 Kiwanis International Dues, \$17 Kiwanis Liability Insurance, \$8 Kiwanis Magazine, \$32 Capital District Dues. The only exceptions would be Life Members of Kiwanis International (who are exempt only from the \$52 KI Dues) and Former Service Leadership Program Members in their first two years of Kiwanis membership who are exempt from both the \$52 KI Dues and the \$32 Capital Dues.

Long Range or Strategic Planning

The Capital District Long Range Planning Committee has suggested possible actions for clubs, divisions and the District to consider and adapt to their own use. This article will concentrate on Membership since the District's October 5 o'clock somewhere Zoom will deal with this topic. But before doing that, let's consider the impact of the COVID pandemic, although the committee hoped that it would be history by now.

What have we learned during the pandemic? What are we doing different now than pre-pandemic? What should we continue doing differently? Would we be more attractive to new members with virtual meetings and in person service projects or fundraisers? Could we use Zoom (or other alternatives) for planning and board meetings? Could we engage new members quickly with projects that can be done safely at home? Could we

open service projects to community members by inviting club partners, SLP club members and families, business owners, and parent-teacher groups to join online or in person? Are there ideas for individuals to work independently such as making contributions of personal care items or care packages for Social Services and involving CKI or Key Club members? Can you spread volunteers out over space or time so they can maintain safe distance?

Clubs Can Purchase More Peace of Mind with Optional Club Insurance

As you may know, part of your annual dues to Kiwanis International provides insurance to every Kiwanis Club and every Kiwanis Family Member. The insurance coverage funded by a portion of your dues includes general liability insurance, as well as directors' & officers' insurance for the boards of Kiwanis Clubs and Kiwanis Foundations.

While those insurance programs are important and do cover most of the risks Kiwanis clubs and their members face, there are some other risks we may face as Kiwanians that are not covered by those two insurance programs. Rest assured, Kiwanis International has negotiated optional club insurance programs to help mitigate certain additional risks that Kiwanis clubs may face.

The first optional insurance program is Club Accident Insurance. If you have been to one of my Risk Management presentations, you have probably heard me explain that the Kiwanis "general liability" insurance applies when someone outside of Kiwanis sues Kiwanis (including an individual Kiwanis Club or Kiwanian) claiming that Kiwanis is liable for an injury they suffered. I also explained that if a Kiwanian or SLP member is injured during a Kiwanis event, the Kiwanis liability insurance does not apply in that situation. That being said, the optional Club Accident Insurance would apply where a Kiwanian or SLP member is injured at an official club event. Coverage is available for as low as \$3 per member and can be purchased to protect SLP members as well as Kiwanians

The second optional insurance program is Club Crime Insurance. Club crime insurance helps mitigate many financial risks a Kiwanis club may face, including embezzlement of funds, check forgery, funds lost in transit, robbery/burglary, and, most importantly, "social engineering fraud." Social engineering fraud is a broad term that refers to scams used by criminals to deceive and/ or manipulate victims into sharing confidential information sending funds in error. Criminals may pose as IRS agents, credit card companies, banks, vendors, or other charitable organizations when contacting victims by telephone, email, and/or text message. They exploit a person's trust to learn banking details, passwords, or other sensitive data, or trick the victim into sending funds to the criminal. Kiwanis clubs are particularly attractive to these criminals because few clubs operate their own email systems and thus cannot control spam filters that might block their members' receipt of such malicious emails. In addition, few clubs offer cybersecurity training that would help their members identify potentially fraudulent emails.

Finally, as Kiwanians, we have a tendency to assume that others share our altruistic intentions and are not always as suspicious as we maybe should be. Sadly, these criminals do not care who they steal from or what the originally intended use was for their ill-gotten gains. But your club can protect itself from the consequences of social engineering fraud and other financial risks by purchasing the optional Club Crime Insurance for as little as \$145 per year.

Applications payments and for the optional Club Accident Club Crime Insurance and/or Insurance are due by October 31, 2021. I want to thank and congratulate Caren Schumacher and her team of Regional Coordinators for what they have done over the last 3 years, particularly given the difficulty of recruiting new members and opening new clubs during the pandemic. Despite COVID-19, the Capital District opened 3 new clubs last year, a remarkable accomplishment. In addition, as of September 29, the clubs in the district have recruited a total of 271 new members during the 2020-2021 Kiwanis year.

I am excited about what the Capital District will be doing this year in growing our membership and strengthening our clubs. I have been busy building a new District membership team. We have Regional Membership Coordinators in all seven regions - including the new West Virginia Region which we welcome into our District family. I have decided this year to add a new position to the membership team-Divisional Membership Coordinators for each of our 20 divisions. The **Divisional Membership Coordinators** will be tasked with getting the

membership message to all clubs and being a resource to the clubs at the local level. They will communicate directly with each club's membership chair. For those clubs without membership chairs, please appoint someone in the club to lead the club's focus on recruiting new members and retaining existing All club membership chairs or other members interested in growing and strengthening their clubs are encouraged to work with their Divisional Coordinator. The Divisional Coordinator is not replacing or changing the role of Lieutenant Governors, but can serve as a resource to the division's Lieutenant Governor.

This year, we will be focusing on strengthening our existing clubs. While we will strive to meet Governor Elana's goal of opening 5 to 8 new clubs this year, we want to emphasize helping our existing clubs, that starts with new members. Governor Elana has a goal of adding 500 new members this year. That goal can be met if each division adds 25 members next year. In other words,

if each division averages adding just 2 members each month, we will reach that goal. Please note that this is not a net member increase, just the number of new persons who become Kiwanians.

Kiwanis has many resources and ideas on how to grow and strengthen our clubs and we want all clubs to take advantage of those resources and ideas. We want to help your club succeed in that endeavor. Please let me or your Regional or Divisional Membership Coordinator know if you want our help. Together we will meet Governor Elana's goals and have a net growth in membership providing our communities and children with more hands to help.

On August 30, the town of Hurley, a community located in Buchanan County Virginia was devastated by major flooding when a rare tropical front produced heavy rains directly over this mountainous region. The flooding began around 9:00 a.m. with Guesses Fork being hit the hardest. Around thirty homes were destroyed seventeen suffered major damage. There was one fatality. As expressed by Andrea McClanahan, President of the Hurley Kiwanis Club: "The devastation was unlike anything I have ever seen. So many of our family, friends, and neighbors lost everything--many homes gone forever with no trace."

Many of the homes that were not completely washed away were left unlivable until cleaning and demolition of the damaged portions and repairs have been completed, with residents forced to relocate to hotels, or accommodations with family or in emergency shelters set up by local churches. Many are unable to return to undamaged homes due to the lack of electricity and running water. It is predicted that it will be a year before the public water system is fully restored.

Due to repairs on the roads, electric lines, water, and phone lines road closures have been a steady struggle. There is only one main road through the town, and it is open as little as 2 hours during the day for travel, so getting food and supplies to the effected families has been difficult. For anyone who has visited this region you can appreciate the difficulty

volunteers have had in walking up mountainous terrain to make these deliveries. Local teenagers came out in large numbers to help deliver food and water, cleaning supplies, and load and unload trucks delivering donations from toothbrushes to furniture that have been sent from near and far to help the community.

Hurley has been blessed to receive donations from throughout the region but larger items such as shovels, wheelbarrows, gas grills, furniture, and the assistance of large equipment like loaders, dozers, and backhoes to clear driveways, yards and debris have been hard to find. Most homeowners did not have flood insurance and those that did had their homes damaged by massive landslides.

Adds Ladonna Blankenship, Hurley Club Secretary: "I have never seen so many landslides at one time. Some leaving rock and debris as high as 15 feet. Rebuilding even if they are blessed to have help from FEMA will be difficult."

School returned to regular session on September 13 only two weeks from the date of the flood, but it has

been challenging. Bridges that cross local creeks have been washed away and bus travel on severely damaged roads is difficult. It is hard for children to keep their minds on school while going through so much.

The damage is much worse than the pictures show. Adds Ladonna: "They honestly to do not show the extent of the damage. It is heartbreaking!! Hurley is a small town, with an average of 40 students per grade in our local schools. We are all a family. Everyone in Hurley was affected by this event, either directly, or by a family member/members or close friends. The postings on Facebook of the damage and family heirlooms being recovered many miles from the area will make you tear up with joy and sadness all at once. Happy they are getting something back and heartbroken at the devastation those items suffered, being torn and broken, and in many cases unrecognizable."

The Hurley Club is deeply appreciative of the support they have received, and targeted to receive, from the various Division 17 clubs and from the Capital District Hurley Disaster Fund, administered through the Capital District Foundation. Their club will take responsibility for allocating these donations within the community, especially in assisting local youth as they seek recovery from this disaster.

Andrea shares the following: "In March 2020, we unexpectedly lost Bobby Hall, our Past President. Our



club was devastated as Bobby was a great leader and friend to all of us. Immediately after Bobby's death, the COVID-19 pandemic attempted to cripple our community outreach efforts. Our group worked together to find ways to adapt to this new environment while safely continuing our community service. In the last few months, with vaccination becomina more common restrictions being lifted, we were gaining ground to return to the "new normal." Our members were ready to hit the ground running. The morning of August 30th would change our plans. Our Kiwanis Club of Hurley is a close-knit group. We are more like family and when one member is hurting, we all are. We are blessed and thankful for the many volunteers and donations for our

community. The outpour of support has been inspiring. There is one thing about living in a small town—we are family and will stand together. We are "Hurley Strong."

"We were effected by water gushing from the mountain behind our home bringing down massive amounts of mud, rock, trees and debris. Applications will once again handled electronically applications being forwarded to Lt. Governors for their clubs. Lt. It is recommended you get the word out, not only to schools where we have SLP clubs, but to all of the schools in your area to include private, parochial and charter schools and even homeschooled students.

The application process will be open until February 1, 2022. Clubs will review their applications during February, divisions during March and the district committee will review certified division winners during April with the district winner being selected by May 1, 2022.

This award is an opportunity to recognize outstanding teens in the district who are between the ages of 13-18. Applicants do not have to be a current or past SLP member or have attended district leadership events. This is a great opportunity for clubs to spread the word about Kiwanis, possibly helping to recruit new members and to share one of the many ways we support the youth in our communities. We look forward to having even more teens participating in the recognition process this year.
